Households in the UK throw away around 336,000 tonnes (£140 million worth) of our unwanted clothing and textiles annually, a shocking statistic when you realise almost all of this waste is going straight to landfill.



For many the changing of the seasons throughout the year inevitably impacts our clothing choices. The coats and jumpers will help keep you warm in the winter, but soon get dismissed as the weather changes in spring-summer. This is where the influx of waste occurs, getting rid of clothing that is no longer in season.

Baby clothing is one of the biggest types of clothing waste that is sent to landfill. As children grow out of clothes, they are quick to get disposed of despite their usually great condition. Many people get rid of the clothing their children have grown out of to make room for more fitting outfits, these outgrown items get sent to landfill.

Style changes are ever changing, as the fashion changes as does many of our styles, leading to us having clear-outs of many clothing that no longer fit our aesthetic. Usually due to ease, these items are put into the general waste to make room for the newer styles.

Other forms of textile waste such as bedding, towels, curtains etc are usually see an influx when we do home renovations. With these items being replaced, there is now no longer a need for them and sadly they usually end up into general waste to be sent to landfill.

Donate

Take your clothes to charity shops or textile recycling bins and units to help recycle such items, a new owner gives them a new lease of life
